Pandemic Closed Museum for Summer

As with every other individual, business, and organization around the country, the Museum was greatly impacted by the Covid-19 pandemic. After much discussion, by late March last year's week-long Pioneer Oil Days celebration was cancelled. After similar soulsearching, it was decided to keep the museum closed all summer. All of our volunteers are older. and the Board didn't feel that is was prudent to put them into situations where their health may have been compromised. At this time, we are not sure

if the museum will open for summer 2021, although we are cautiously optimistic.

The pandemic impacted us in several ways. First, the Museum was unable to accomplish many planned projects. Second, visitors always spread the news of their visit by word-ofmouth, and of course, we didn't get any of that positive publicity. Finally, many individuals and businesses were hurt by the economic collapse and were unable to support us financially. This loss of support will be VERY difficult to make up.

Joyce Building Exhibits Upgraded

Although the museum was technically closed for the summer, lots was still happening, and several projects did get completed. Perhaps the largest project accomplished was an overhaul of the Joyce Exhibit Building. In order to get more space to move equipment around, the Wesche exhibit had a "boat" built underneath it. Constructed on casters, it allows for that large exhibit to be moved around in the building providing room for fork lifts and tractors to move newlydonated equipment. Museum Board member and railroad aficionado, Robert Richards, then spent numerous hours painting the railroad section of the exhibit, as well as installing "ballast" under the rails to make them look more authentic.

The engines in the Rumsey collection were also moved to help provide more space. The oilfield engine collection was reorganized, and all engines in working condition were started to keep them in shape for next summer.

Historic Triangle #1 Site Restored and Re-Dedicated

Last fall, the museum celebrated the "re-dedication" of the Triangle #1 monument and associated New York State Historic Marker. These two items commemorate Orville P. (O.P.) Taylor and his drilling of the first major oil well of the Allegany County field in 1879.

Upon inspection of the site, it was found that the concrete monument was badly eroded, thus necessitating its restoration by reforming and repainting for future protection. The New York State Historic Marker was also sandblasted, painted, and clear coated, so it will last for many years.

The museum board decided to further protect the historic stonework for future generations. Using materials donated by Cummins Construction of Cuba, a pavilion was built over the monument. On the inside of the pavilion, numerous pho-

tographs and documents related to the drilling of Triangle #1 and the life of O.P. Taylor were placed in weather-proof, exterior picture frames mounted on the wall. A section of artificial turf, originally part of the BRCS football field and donated by Evingham Site Excavation, was installed on the ground inside the pavilion providing a completed walking surface for visitors.

Other Happenings at the Museum

In addition to the work accomplished at Triangle #1 and the Joyce Exhibit Building, lots of other exiting events took place.

The Allegany County Chamber of Commerce and Office of Tourism visited the museum in September and filmed the tour. A series of short videos they produced may be viewed on our Facebook page.

Last fall our two state representatives, Senator George Borrello and Assemblyman Joe Giglio, took an indepth visit to each museum venue. Both men learned a great deal about our local heritage, and as Senator Borrello noted, "The American oil industry was born in our region and our communities grew with it. Most of the grand old homes lining the

streets of Bolivar and Wellsville were built by early oil titans."



Some board members spent time searching the woods looking for equipment that still may be restored into working condition. This can be quite a chore because much of this equipment has been idle for many years, subjected to the ravages of our weather. These members looked not only for oilfield engines, but also for any other unique pieces that were used in the local industry. We realize that much of this equipment will never run again, but they can provide more information and a unique perspective on the infrastructure that built the oil and gas empire that developed in this region.

Several local oil and gas field veterans passed away during the past year. Included in this group were Norm Mesler, Will Burdick, Dean Phillips, and Jim Euken. An anonymous donor established a foundation in Euken's name through the Allegany County Area Foundation. This will provide funding to the museum each year. Those interested may donate to the ACAF in Jim's name, or directly to the museum.

Plans are underway to install a new roof on the Pittsburgh,
Shawmut and Northern Railroad depot in the spring. Combined with the nearly \$25,000 spent to stabilize the floor and foundation over the past few years, the new roof will protect the building (built in 1900) until funding to renovate the structure can be acquired.

Arthur E. Yahn, Jr. Previous Wall of Fame Inductee

Arthur E. Yahn Jr. followed in his father's footsteps as a leader in the local oil and gas industry. Like his father, he was an officer and director in the Messer Oil Corporation as well as DYMO Oil Corporation.

Arthur was a graduate of Princeton University, and he attended Wharton Business and Harvard Law Schools. He served on the Olean Board of Education for nearly ten years, and he was president of that group at one time. He was a mem-

ber of the Olean Kiwanis Club, the Olean Trap Club, and a director for Columbia Gas.



He was also a member of the St. Vincent DePaul Society, and he attended St. John's Church.

Ray Collins And His Gang

Ray Collins and his boys are still pushing on the home front to get that oil out of the ground that Uncle Sam needs so badly. Probably his newest readache is the development started on the mountains of California Hollow. The flood pattern has been laid out and, from the conversation and remarks of "Pop", each one is worse than the last, but knowing "Pop" and his gang, they will all be brought in some time. "Whitey" Johnson seems to have drawn the job of supervising the pulling of the old natural wells on this property, some sixteen of which are being junked and old oil and gas lines taken up to make room for the new development. Three core wells have been drilled and things will move soon.

The oil field is still handicapped for want of men but everyone is digging in a little harder. Harold Emery is keeping track of material in addition to other work and Carlyle Myers is all over the field.

Between September 13th and October 17th the Wellsville end has completed seven wells on the McBride, two on the Rolls, three on the Simerson and one on the Angel. On the Bolivar end, three wells have been brought in on the Smith Gray and two on the Koehler. Two wells have been finished on the Sage.

The Stimson & Bell Torpedo Shell factory is a going concern. It was established in 1914 by Hills & Bell and is still furnishing shells for glycerine companies operating in the Allegany oil field.

W. R. Maxson, a Belivar boy, is shop foreman and at present, besides the office force, four or five men are employed in factory work.

They also handle the Eternit and Johns-Manville * roofing, Oil-O-Matic heating, Pennsylvania fuel oil, specializing in copper, galvanized work and electrical installation.

The firm is always optimistic and interested in keeping Bolivar growing and on the map.
