# Museum's Purchase of Hahn & Schaffner Site Complete

The purchase of the property housing the old Hahn & Schaffner Pipe Supply Company has finally been completed! Lengthy paperwork snafus have now been concluded, and the property officially belongs to the Pioneer Oil Museum.

In 2008 the Museum was fortunate to secure two legislative member grants from our local New York State representatives, Senator Catherine Young and Assemblyman Joe Giglio. These grants were designated for use in repairing and restoring the old Hahn & Schaffner site. These funds allowed the Museum to bid out renovation work on the old store. The work will be finished this spring, and it includes a variety of areas. The roof on the original store and on the later addition will be repaired, as will the roof on the old welding shop. Interior renovations in the former store include new and updated

electrical system, heating system, and bathroom as well as new insulation and refurbished walls and ceilings. Additional improvements to the exterior of the building will also help improve the looks and security of the structure.

The next step for the Board of Directors is to decide how best to use the new site as well as the existing site on Main Street. Owning these two locations provides many options for the Museum. Different displays with different themes may be set up in the two places. The new site includes about six acres of land, so there will be room for outdoor displays and exhibits. Protection and preservation of antique oilfield machinery and engines will become a priority for the museum.

#### **Museum Awarded Grant**

The Pioneer Oil Museum received a \$530 grant from the Allegany County Area Foundation (ACAF) last fall. The grant will be used to fund computer scanning equipment that will help with the Archives Copying Project. This project is designed to make copies of all documents and photographs in the Museum's collection. Such items could be lost in a fire or other disaster. Items such as photographs that are displayed in the museum are at risk from natural

sunlight, which can destroy these irreplaceable items. Local oilman and consultant Rob Eberling completed the paperwork for this project.

The ACAF awarded over \$250,000 in financial assistance in 2007-08. This included scholarships to 150 local students and grants to not-for-profit agencies, all in Allegany County.



## The Museum Wants You!

As always, the museum is looking for visitors to work and help keep the museum open. Each volunteer works just one three-hour block of time per week. We are only open weekdays (unless someone would like to open up on the weekend) from 10:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. And if you simply want to get out of the house on a pleasant summer day and enjoy the weather, what better place to do it than at the museum.

### **Growing Up in Bolivar**

Bill Gray, former resident of Bolivar and graduate of the class of 1954, has written a book called <u>Growing Up in Bolivar in the 1940's and 1950's</u>. Gray, now a resident of Arizona, read with interest some of the articles from the local historical society and wanted to contribute some of his own memories of his childhood. He wanted to describe life in an oil town and what it was like to spend time on the rigs and the leases.

While writing the book, Gray became more interested in the technical aspects of the oil and gas industry. Supplied with this kind of information from Ray Payne and Dick Fitch, his book expanded and became a 374 page history of the oil industry from its local beginnings in 1881 until present day.

The book is loaded with wonderful pictures mostly related w the oil industry. Yet part is a recollection of businesses and people of the area. Gray supplied copies to all of the schools, museums, and libraries in the area. Check this out at the Museum.

## **NYSOPA Previous Wall of Fame Inductees**

#### William Barry - Wall of Fame Class 2007

Bill Barry was a graduate of Olean High School, later attending St. Bonaventure University. During World War II he served with the U.S. Army. He was married and raised a family of four sons and one daughter.

Bill served the local oil and gas industry in an unbelievably huge variety of jobs. He worked for Messer Oil Co. in various capacities from 1937 to 1984 and eventually became president. He was president of DYMO Oil Corporation in Chatham, Ohio, director and president of the McKean Natural Gas Co. and secretary-treasurer of Barry Resources. He was vice-president of the National Stripper Well Association as well as serving on the advisory board of that organization. He was a board member of the New York State Oil, Gas and Solution Mining group and a member of the

Independent Petroleum Association of America, serving as an executive committee member. Finally, he played an integral role in the New York State Oil Producers' Association (NYSOPA).


Bill was involved in community affairs in Olean by joining the Kiwanis Club and St. Vincent De Paul Society. He served as member, director, and past president of Bartlett Country Club. He attended St. John's Church and was a member of the local Knights of Columbus chapter.

#### Bill Hogan - Wall of Fame Class 2006

Bill Hogan was a native of Bolivar. He graduated from Bolivar High School and then returned there to live. He and his wife raised six children. During World War II he achieved the rank of lieutenant commander.

Bill's legacy was firmly established in the Bolivar area. He served as director of the former State Bank of

Bolivar for many years. He worked as an officer of the St. Mary's Cemetery Association and was a lifetime member of St. Mary's Catholic Church. As a military veteran, he came home and helped found the Kenyon Andrus American Legion Post 772.



Amazingly, Bill lived to be 99 years old, passing away just five months to the day before his 100th birthday.

#### Gordon Hahn - Wall of Fame Class 2005

Gordon "Gordie" Hahn, a native of Bradford, Pennsylvania, began work in the local oil industry after graduation from high school. He first worked for the Bradford Supply Company and later became a major

stockholder and vice-president for Hahn & Schaffner in Bolivar. He was also a lifetime member of the New York State Oil Producers' Association, serving as an officer and member. He was affiliated with the Empire State Water Well Association and the National Water Well Association.

During World War II Gordie served in the U.S.

Army as a paratrooper. He was a member of the Bolivar Fire Department and of the Bolivar American Legion for 57 years. He volunteered his time and served on the Bolivar Free Library as a member and past president. He was also associated with the Shriners. He and his wife Gail raised three children in Bolivar.


